### CHANCELLOR PARK PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT – WHAT WE HEARD REPORT

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

THAT the June 10, 2024 report from the Community Planner titled "Chancellor Park Public Engagement – What We Heard Report" be received for information.

### **PURPOSE:**

To present Council with a summary of "What We Heard" from the Chancellor Park public engagement events held on June 5 and June 8, 2024, as well as the online survey which launched on May 27, 2024 and closed on June 9, 2024.

### TIME CRITICAL:

The Chancellor Park Playground Replacement was budgeted as a 2024 capital project.

### **BACKGROUND:**

The engagement process was undertaken from Monday, May 27, 2024 to Sunday, June 9, 2024 with a mix of online engagement (survey) and two in-person open houses held at various times to remove barriers to participation. 133 people participated in the process.

The two in-person engagement opportunities took place on the following dates:

- A drop-in open house was held on Wednesday, June 5, 2024 at Eagle Creek Village Quality Foods from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m.; and
- An outdoor open house was held Saturday, June 8, 2024 at Chancellor Park from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m.

During the open houses, participants could view a series of informational boards and speak to Town staff and consultants in-person.

The responses and input from the engagement process will inform the playground upgrade as well as the future development and use of the park space.

### **DISCUSSION:**

As noted above, a total of 133 people participated in the Chancellor Park public engagement process with 41 of those attending the open houses and 92 completing the online survey. A comprehensive summary of the responses and feedback received during the engagement process is provided in Attachment 1.

### Overall Themes:

- Participants were supportive of the introducing of universally accessible playground equipment.
- Survey respondents and attendees at both open houses indicated a preference for climbing structures, in-ground trampolines, and swings as the top three playground features.
- Park furniture (e.g. chairs, benches, picnic tables), grassy open spaces and shaded areas were the top three preferred features respondents and attendees wanted to see in the park. Some park users indicated their preference that not all park furniture should be focused on the playground.
- Some respondents noted that with the park's proximity to the Galloping Goose, can be a safety hazard and suggested that a fence separating the park users from the cyclists would be beneficial to keep children from running onto the path or balls rolling under cyclists as they pass by.
- Other attendees were concerned about reducing the amount of greenspace currently available in the park. Many park users expressed how they would often

see people use the space to sit and enjoy the sun, toss a ball for their dog, or just run around.

- While some expressed a desire for an off-leash dog area, others strongly opposed the park becoming an off-leash dog park and pushed for signage to indicate that dogs must remain on-leash.
- Many envisioned the park as a space for all ages and accessibility levels; and hoped to have the park become a destination with multiple activities and/or features in the park, that were not exclusive use of any one group.
- Some especially those living in closer proximity to the park had concerns about noise and expressed fear that the park would be used for unwanted activities.
- Several park users indicated a desire for a public washroom and additional lighting
  to be available on site. Yet, many other park users indicated that a public
  washroom may bring with it more unwanted activities to the park and would
  possibly require monitoring and/or only be open during daytime hours.
- Some residents also indicated a desire to have a formal path connecting Cheltenham Street to the Park. Currently Cheltenham Street is connected to the park via a dirt path that is not maintained and is often muddy when it rains, and slippery during the winter.
- Social media, signage in the park and on the Town's website were the top three ways of how people wanted to be kept informed about the process for this project.

### **CONCLUSION:**

The input collected from these public engagement activities will inform the draft design concept for Chancellor Park playground. Once staff have prepared a draft concept for the playground, staff will present the concept at a future Council meeting.

### WHAT WE HEARD SUMMARY CONSULTATION REPORT

Planning for Chancellor Park Playground Improvements Town of View Royal Tavola Strategy Group

**JUNE 2024** 

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### PROJECT OVERVIEW

Chancellor Park is a neighbourhood park located at the end of Chancellor Avenue and Quincy Street. The approximately 0.3-acre space is located between the Galloping Goose Regional Trail and Highway 1, not far from Victoria General Hospital and Eagle Creek Village. In addition to serving the local Hospital neighbourhood, the park is a destination for people who walk and bike on the Galloping Goose Trail as well as for workers and visitors to the nearby hospital.

The playground located within Chancellor Park is scheduled to be updated in 2024. These updates will include universally accessible playground equipment that provides improved access to play for persons of all abilities. Accessible play spaces ensure persons with disabilities can actively participate and play. The features, materials and layout are designed to meet the needs of all.

As the Town grows, park infrastructure needs to be enhanced or replaced to provide safe and functional recreational opportunities for families to enjoy. The objective of the playground replacement project in Chancellor Park is to increase usage and enjoyment by providing a range of passive and active recreational opportunities for people of all ages, abilities, and interests.

### The existing park includes:

- a half-court with basketball hoop and hockey net;
- picnic tables;
- park benches;
- water fountain;
- playground area;
- public parking; and
- an open lawn area.

The Town has allocated funds in the 2024 Capital Budget for construction.

The engagement process was undertaken from Monday, May 27, 2024, to Sunday, June 9, 2024.



### **ENGAGEMENT OBJECTIVES**


- 1. To raise awareness of plans to update Chancellor Park including plans to convert the existing playground to a universally accessible playground.
- 2. To provide in-person and online opportunities for the community to learn more and provide input that will inform playground improvements to the park.
- 3. To close the loop with participants and View Royal residents about how public input informed the park design.

### **ENGAGEMENT PROCESS**

### **Awareness-raising**

- A detailed project website and FAQ were developed.
- Signs were installed in Chancellor Park.
- A QR code was used on posters and signage for easy online survey access.
- Posters were distributed throughout the neighbourhood.
- Social media posts were shared on Facebook and Twitter.
- A media release was distributed to local media.
- A letter was hand-delivered to ~250 homes in Hospital and Northern Gateway neighbourhoods.
- Outreach to Eagle View, View Royal and Marigold Elementary Schools and Parent Advisory Councils.
- Letter distributed by property manager at Camden Green [21 Conard Street].

### **Input Methods**

- An online survey was launched with a dedicated URL
  - www.viewroyal.ca/chancellorparkupgrades
- A Drop-in open house was held Wednesday, June 5, 2024, from 5 p.m. 7 p.m. at Eagle Creek Village Quality Foods.
- An outdoor open house was held Saturday, June 8, 2024, from 10 a.m. 12 noon at Chancellor Park.

### **Engagement by the numbers:**

- 133 people participated in the process
  - 41 Open House attendees
  - 92 Online Surveys

### WHAT WE HEARD

- While some expressed a desire for off-leash dog park, some others strongly opposed to the park becoming an off-leash dog park and pushed for signage to indicate that dogs must remain on-leash.




Question 1: Do you live in View Royal? (92 responses)




Question 2: If no, which community do you live in?


**Question 3:** How many years have you been a resident of View Royal? (79 responses)



**Question 4:** How close do you live to Chancellor Park? (92 responses)




**Question 5:** What is your connection with Chancellor Park? (89 responses)




- I run by Chancellor Park


**Question 6:** How often do you visit Chancellor Park? (92 responses)



**Question 7:** What is your age? (92 responses)





- Bark chips are not accessible. Folks in manual or powered wheelchairs can't navigate them.
- Posting signs that it's a playground and not an off-leash dog park. Too many dogs off leash running up to kids without warning
- Not sure what the proposed updates are
- This park has already been updated and is well equipped for its size, Portage Inlet Linear Park desperately needs separate pedestrian and cycling paths, beach improvements, and play equipment. Also fencing to separate the park from the highway.
- Always a concern of having homeless move into these spaces. So far we haven't had too much problem.
- Would like there to still be green space. The park is used often for sunbathing and relaxing.
- During your upgrade period, can we still use the park?
- \$300k is way too much out of limited park improvement reserve for one park. We have lots of parks that need amenities like covered areas now. The options should have been WITH price tags. Does this mean we can only afford ONE universally accessible playground in all of View Royal, or then next one would have to wait for 10 years?
- Noise posted signage of 'quiet hours'. Garbage ensure adequate # of stone cans and timely removal of garbage. More strategic planting in front of park bench. Currently, the bench near the fountain stares directly at our house, into our garage when people are sitting there. Or better positioning of the bench so it is facing a different direction. There are already enough open sight lines of the park. If things like bike stations or similar are built, please put them at

further end of park so there are not hordes of people impacting adjacent neighbours with noise.

- I'm concerned that the green space in the park will be reduced
- Because of issues with people using this stretch of the Goose for overnight sleeping (especially now that there is a liquor store across the street) I would definitely not recommend a covered picnic area.
- Can we add a sand station with tractors/excavators


**Question 12:** Do you have other ideas on how to make Chancellor Park and playground the best it can be? (52 responses)

- Small pickleball court would be really cool! Or a small entirely fenced in dog run for all the condo living dogs near by!

- Make it a playground specific for toddlers and similar to the playgrounds that Langford are doing (McCormick meadows, Chief Al LeQuesne Park, or West Hills), natural playground materials or include more natural playground like Hither Green Park in Esquimalt

- Provide a small fence area for SMALL dogs. Knocken Hill is the only off leash area east of Helmcken and WAY too far.


- Off- leash dog area? Woodland based structures


### RESPONSES FROM THE OPEN HOUSES

The first Open House was held at on Wednesday, June 5, 2024, from 5pm-7pm at the Eagle Creek Quality Foods, and the second Open House was held at the park site, on Saturday, June 8, 2024, from 10am-12pm. Participants viewed a series of informational boards and spoke to staff and consultants onsite. Interactive display boards invited attendees to answer a series of questions. A children's activity table included parks colour posters and markers. During the second Open House, participants also had the opportunity to walk around and sit in the park space. Bubbles and hula hoops were available for children.

A total of 41 attendees who participated in the Open Houses.




**Question 3:** Do you have any other ideas on how to make Chancellor Park playground the best it can be?


### **NEXT STEPS**

A new universally accessible playground is being planned for Chancellor Park, a neighbourhood park located at the end of Chancellor Avenue and Quincy Street. Universally accessible playgrounds provide improved access to play for children and families of all abilities. The park currently features a half court with basketball hoop/hockey net, picnic tables, playground, and open lawn area.






Located in the growing Hospital neighbourhood, the property is between Highway 1 and the Galloping Goose Regional Trail. In addition to serving the local neighbourhood, the park holds potential as a destination for people who walk and bike on the Galloping Goose Trail and visitors and workers to Victoria General Hospital.

We are early in our planning and want to hear what playground features you would like to see included. Upon conclusion of public consultation, a What We Heard consultation summary report will be presented to View Royal Council in summer 2024. It will also be available online. Construction is planned for 2024.






